Abstract: Scholars know little about how bisexual parents navigate their queer identities, particularly as they interact with their children. Part of the explanation for this is that when researchers study bisexual parents, they often misclassify these parents as straight or gay depending on the gender of their partner. I use data from an online survey to examine bisexual parents' perspectives on coming out to their children. The sample consists of 767 US parents (47 percent bisexual, 25 percent lesbian, 20 percent straight, 7 percent gay, and 7 percent asexual). I use a qualitative, thematic analysis of the open-ended question "Do you plan to tell your current children about your sexual orientation? Why or why not?" to compare responses across sexual orientation and gender. I find that bisexuals, regardless of gender or relationship status, are more likely than gay and lesbian respondents to provide answers related to "honesty" or "solidarity" as their motivation for planning to come out to their children. I argue that these motivations may reflect bisexual parents' attempts to navigate the stigma and erasure they experience in both straight and queer spaces.
